# Aileron and Jim's Safety Corner

## **How Fast Should You Taxi?**

I can't count the number of times I watch aircraft taxiing to the run-up area as if they were trying to takeoff on the taxi way. Why hurry? So what should be the safe taxi speed?

The 'right' taxi speed is the one appropriate to the conditions taking into account the wind, the taxiway surface and width, the presence of other aircraft and what type of



aircraft you are operating. Slow down on those windy days especially when turning. The rougher or more uneven the taxiway surface, the slower you should go. Slow down if you have to pass close to another airplane. Remember that retractable landing gear is not designed to take high speed turns. However, when conditions are ideal, taxi at a speed that is appropriate to your personal minimums and is safe to you, your aircraft and everyone around you. Remember, don't takeoff while taxiing. Do that on the runway!

The taxi speed on my last few flights varied from less than 5 knots to over 25. The low end was used when making a turn out of the wind on a seriously windy day. The fast speed was to help a ground controller avoid congestion around a runway intersection, on a perfectly straight, smooth, wide taxiway, on a calm wind day. And was only used briefly.

Some folks say to monitor your groundspeed on GPS, but I don't agree with this advice. You should be heads-up with your eyes focused outside the airplane while taxiing. If you must check the GPS, ask yourself what speed you expect to see before you look and see how close you were. This will train your speed sense and soon you won't need to check the GPS. Your eyes will have already told you how fast you're going.

insight into what to expect when communicating with ATC. Also, at Pilot Workshops you will find other great manuals such as, "IFR Communications", "IFR Procedures", "How ATC Really Works" and more.

Well, get out there and fly, fly often and slow down that taxiing and get to the runup area safely.

#### THE WAY IT WAS



Way back about 1952 when I was a 14-year-old punk living in a town called Chicago Heights, Illinois, I was riding my new Schwinn bike down Chicago Road to my cousin's house. I heard an airplane engine coming up behind me like I had never heard before, a low, even kind of a moan with a very strong hint of massive power. It was a cloudy day with an overcast ceiling of about 2500 feet so this thing was down fairly low and moving very fast. I recognized it as a P51 and still have the image of it in my mind's eye.

I later found out it was owned by a man named Bill Ross who would later become well known

in the EAA Warbirds of America. He based the Mustang at the Joliet Illinois airport, about 30 miles away. It seems the area southwest of Chicago was becoming a hotbed of WWII aircraft of all kinds. There were so many surplus exmilitary aircraft at many of the small and large airports of that day and that area.

Dr. Lou Antonacci tells of this interesting tale in the current issue of Air Classics magazine....about in 1979 he was restoring a Corsair and ran across a like-new propeller that a friend of his had, so he bought it to use as a spare. Naturally curious about where his friend got it, he asked where his friend got this prop. Turns out that a Grumman Hellcat and a Corsair used interchangeable props. About 30 years prior, his friend was driving along old Route 12 near Oak Lawn, Illinois, and watched as a man pulled his pickup truck over and opened up the tailgate and rolled a lightly loaded drum from the road into a farmer's field about 50 feet. There was some oil in the barrel, and the man lit it and soon the air was filled with black smoke. Soon a Grumman Hellcat from WWII appeared on the horizon and set up for a downwind, then base, then final, landing in this farmer's field and taxied up to near this smokepot which was still throwing black smoke 1000 feet in the air.

A short time later a Cessna landed and pulled up next to the Hellcat, and the man with the barrel snuffed the fire out, offered everyone a cup of coffee and asked 'what was the deal?' Turns out it was a CAP/Chicago Vocational School joint exercise., and they were practicing "find the missing airplane." A short time later they all left in the Cessna and just left the Hellcat sitting there in the farmer's field.



Time went by and pretty soon it was planting time, and the farmer needed to have the Hellcat removed. The friend called the school that owned the Hellcat and was told if he wanted the plane, he could have it for free! So, rather than sell the plane as is, where is, he figured he could make more money by parting it out. He wrapped a chain around the landing gear and proceeded to pull the plane over to his shop and started the salvage work.

That, of course, is where the spare prop came from. Wonder how much it is worth today?

# **Important update on Chandler Airport Access Pin Codes**

Pin codes issued by Airports to CVAA members are for the sole purpose of accessing the field when attending the CVAA monthly meetings. They are going to be issued only to "active" CVAA members who attend the meetings. The Airports Department does check with CVAA on a regular basis to ensure they are issuing Pin Codes to active CVAA members only. In order for a CVAA member to be issued and maintain a Chandler Pin Code, that member must attend at least three (3) CVAA General Meetings per calendar year. If you are unable to attend at least three (3) CVAA General Meetings per year, you will be considered an inactive member, and your Pin Code will be discontinued. You can still attend the general meetings, but you will need to contact Jim Shamp so that he can escort you onto the field. To be considered an Active member, please be sure to sign in at the General Meetings and attend a minimum of three (3) meetings per year.
