Aileron and Jim's Safety Corner

Four Rules for Safe Flying



I was recently preparing some lessons for a student preparing to obtain his Multiengine Flight Instructor rating when I ran across a briefing on "Four Rules for Safe Multiengine Flying" and thought this really applies to all our flying. These four rules are not just for multi engine operations, but for all types of flying in all types of aircraft. They are not complicated or difficult to manage but help us to strive for greater safety. Most of us probably comply with these rules but sometimes we overlook or fail to accomplish one or two. Oh! That could be 25 or 50% of them and that could spell disaster. But when flying by a

pilot who is well trained and proficient and not breaking the rules, flying can be fun, well rewarding and most of all safe.

So lets take a look at the "Four Rules for Safe Flying".

Rule #1. **Respect the aircraft!** When taking off and getting airborne it can be very exciting and one can feel they can do anything, go anywhere. But, there are a couple of things to remember. First, you are not an airliner and you are not flying an F-15. There are limitations based on a number of performance factors such as weather, loading, and engine performance. All of which will bring you back to reality very quickly, let alone maybe back to the ground unexpectedly. Secondly, your training is not a typical indicator of what you will expect in real life. Think about it, your training was accomplished in conditions that do not replicate how you will be flying with all your family on board in the summer with high density conditions, at airports you are not familiar with. Remember, respect the aircraft and what it is capable of really doing. This brings us to rule number two...

Rule #2. **Plan like a pro!** Since you are not flying an airliner or an F-15 you should aspire to flight plan like a pro. Consider performance at those special airports with nearby terrain, altitude considerations, runway conditions and, Oh yes, time of day. Remember, the margin of error is slimmer in our GA aircraft than in our F-15. Consider a risk assessment tool. This can be a simple "go, no go" decision application based upon evaluation of those parameters that will affect the safety of flight. There are online risk assessment tools and will help in develop the mind set that will help you to make that decision to operate your aircraft more safely.

Rule #3. **Cut yourself some slack!** The performance numbers were achieved buy a professional pilot under very specific conditions and your results may vary. Its important to think of those numbers as best case scenario rather than expected outcomes. So how do you build in that extra margin? There are no set rules but set your performance numbers a bit higher, sort of like "dipping your feet in the water and getting use to it rather than jumping in all at once" set some personal minimums and then work from there as you build experience.

Rule #4. **Proficiency is Key!** Last and most important is staying proficient in the airplane. This means staying not only proficient in normal operations, but most importantly in emergency procedures. Seek out instruction by instructors well versed in the type of aircraft you are flying and the avionics equipment you have on board. Remember, proficiency is staying mentally engaged. Practice not only makes you proficient, but prepares you mentally for the unexpected.

Proficiency will help you "speed up and slow down" in the cockpit. That might sound strange, but by "speed up" that helps you anticipate and deal with abnormal situations and by "slow down", you will be calmer and less likely to rush and make panic mistakes. In other words, do what you have been taught to do and go with the procedures.

So remember, be realistic about the limitations of the aircraft, put greater emphasis on flight planning, build in extra safety margins into your flight operations and making an effort to build a higher level of proficiency not just only for you but for you and your passengers.

Remember those four rules and get out there and fly safely and fly often,

When Sharon and I bought our first Bonanza in 2005, I joined the American Bonanza Society and at that time there was a Flying Octogenarian named Johnny Miller writing a monthly article for the magazine. I believe he was right around age 95 at that time. Of course, this was before the insurance companies started singling out pilots over age 80 and non-renewing their policies. So john was flying all over the United States and visiting different family members and friends he had made through the years. He was based in Poughkeepsie, New York, and back in the '30s and '40s had been the FBO operator, doing what FBO owners always did, selling, renting, maintaining and flying airplanes.

He owned a New Standard biplane that was his personal plane, and he had a German Shepherd dog whose name escapes me just now, let's call him Fido, that he had rigged a harness for so that Fido could ride in the front cockpit and be safely strapped in. Johnny and Fido would take off in the open cockpit New Standard and fly around awhile, then make sure the pattern was empty and come back over the airport with enough altitude to perform a loop, with Fido barking all the way around the loop and bringing smiles to all on the ground watching and listening.

One day a couple of teenage boys were playing catch and keep-away from Fido with the dog watching for any opportunity to grab the ball, when the ball rolled under a tailwheel airplane. Just then the pilot yelled "clear" and hit the starter as Fido was running at full speed to grab that ball. The ball rolled all the way back to the tailwheel, and the engine started a couple of seconds before Fido got to the front of the plane. The spectators were aghast at what was seemingly going to be the end of Fido. As he was going as fast as he was, there was no way he could stop in time, so he just hunkered down and skidded under the now idling killer prop and grabbed the ball in his teeth and BACKED out from under the plane and its whirling propeller, his fur on his back being raised up an inch or two as he backed out. He was, after all, an airport dog.

John Miller was still flying his v-tail Bonanza at age 100 and was the first to fly an Autogyro from Los Angeles to New York. He deemed the Pitcairn Autogyro the safest airplane in the world.
